REPORT FROM THE TREASURER

In early August the Auditor's report was completed showing an operating loss for the 2012 financial year of \$77071. (Refer to the Annual Report for further information). Immediate action was taken to reduce costs with cuts to office hours and Board meetings no longer face to face.

The main source of income for the Institute is from registration fees of \$155 per participant for Basic and Advanced Intensive training, and \$20 per participant for Practicum training. There is no income for the Institute from accredited programs or workshops that are held throughout the country.

Income from the current form of training has been steadily decreasing over the past decade to the current point where it is no longer a reliable source of income for the Institute.

Membership has not increased despite offering free membership to all Basic Intensive participants in 2011/2012 and no increase to membership fees. The office staff have contacted past members via email and letters with little positive result.

The Board's media program to increase the exposure of Choice Theory through social media has been highly successful with over 200 facebook members. If you are not already a member of this I suggest you take a look – the articles are very useful. Unfortunately, there is no income from this.

It costs to provide a service and maintaining the office is one of these. The office provides a very responsive service to members and non-members. Telephone and email enquiries are answered promptly. We are in the process of improving the website and database to be more easily accessible and user friendly. We have, over the past few years run Faculty trainings at a loss in an effort to support the growth of a younger faculty team.

Conferences are expected to be another source of income. Whilst the content at our last two conferences (in Melbourne and Alice Springs) have been exceptional, the attendances at both have been poor with both conferences' running at a loss.

The Conference in Adelaide, October 2013 needs your support. Let's make this one the best one yet financially!

What to do? Does the Institute need to change its business model? Does it become affiliated with a Registered Training Organisation? The Board has asked faculty if they would be interested in running accredited programs for a fee. Fees for advertising on the Institute website are another possible income source. Does the Institute become a wholly voluntary organisation? Who will maintain the database (training records and membership), keep the website updated, answer calls and emails, send out training packs......

On a more positive note, I attended WGI-A the biennial conference in Alice Springs in October last year. The Red Centre is the spiritual heart of our amazing country. Travelling with my husband, Paula Baxter (the Institute's administration officer) and Cathy Dillon was truly an experience I will hold close to my heart forever. What fun we had surrounded by the awesome beauty of this fascinating land.

May/June this year was my first big trip overseas to the USA to attend the LA Conference at Loyola Marymount University – William Glasser's home. Paula and I travelled together to San Francisco, Las Vegas, the Grand Canyon and Los Angeles prior to the conference. I loved every moment – even when I fell over at Disneyland and fractured my wrist! The Conference was an emotional experience for me. To see, first hand, the aging William (Bill) Glasser, hearing Jim Roy tell Bill's story in the yet to be published book of Bill's life, to meet and reconnect with Choice Theory friends, to hear the great work that is being done throughout the world and to just have FUN. I am now planning on travelling to Canada for the Conference in 2014. Choice Theory is proving to be my opportunity to travel!

I would like to take this opportunity to thank my fellow Board members for their tireless work and to Paula and Jodie, our fantastic office staff.

REPORT FROM THE HONORARY SECRETARY

Twelve months ago we reported on increasing numbers for training and more flexible delivery, growing membership, the Australian Glasser school self-evaluation and much marketing activity. We have since, managed a great conference, followed up many of the conference feedback ideas, endorsed the budget for 2011/12, worked many hours to update The Addendum, continued to develop the "Voice of Choice", engaged with the Ipswich Council, developed a role statement for the Australian / New Zealand International Board member, approved the Adelaide group to run the 2013 conference, enjoyed the company of many Glasserians at the Los Angeles Conference as well as completing countless other items of business in relation to our Action Plan.

Ongoing work includes; Completing the Data-Base & Website, Family Court work approval, designing a template for Basic Intensive Training feedback, Review of the Articles of the Association with consideration of life membership and conflict of interest, Registering schools on the Choice Theory journey online, report quarterly on progress of Funded Projects, developing a WGIA brochure.

The realisation that WGIA's ability to trade for another twelve months due in the main to lack of activity, has become the Board's focus since July. Many forecast trainings did not eventuate and a number of sessions that were completed had fewer people attending than expected. In short, we need to change practices and concentrate on growing income.

It would appear that many other groups engaged in similar work have a large national profile, market in a populist manner and attract much sponsorship and funding from governments. We are investigating possible funding bodies.

Countless testimonies assure us that many people who complete our training or connect through Choice Theory have new knowledge and enabling skills. The Board seeks ideas and suggestions — what captured you long enough to take on Glasser's ideas? What are the elements you endorse and tell others? What are the attractants that will enable others to inquire?

The Position Description for our Regional Coordinators is daunting. It is best to regard it as a list of possibilities. In contacting our RC's I learn that no one is hanging out with time to spare, yet many tasks, meetings and promotions occur due to their persistence. RC's can only be successful when members in the regions buy-in to local activities. Members can learn more by reading their reports, contacting their Regional Coordinator or calling me. We have just one vacant RC position now, Tasmania.

It has been my observation, over three years that the Board Members contribute unstintingly of their skills, expertise and energy to WGIA's work and promotion. As your Board members worked hard together they became a caring, supportive, inclusive team, capable of open and frank debate on all issues raised. Meeting by electronic means has enabled us to continue the business efficiently, in my judgement, because the Board was already a great team. My thanks to the Board members who have made my job easier.

Thanks Paula and Jodie for your prompt and continuing assistance in all matters.

Congratulations also to Evelyn Koh (of Singapore), our second endorsement of an International Instructor. From the perspective of the board it is great to see an expanding number of high quality Instructors within Australia.

Thanks to Maggie Bolton, Judy Hatswell, and Ivan Honey for providing excellent support, great instruction and for sustaining the high quality of our Faculty Training. Thanks also to Sylvia Habel, Judy Hatswell, Ivan Honey, Maggie Bolton for your tireless FPC work with upcoming supervisors and instructors. We appreciate the benefit of your experience, wisdom and guided self evaluation for our next generation of trainers.

This gives the WGI-A 8 Senior Faculty, 14 BIT Instructors, 35 Practicum Supervisors giving us a total of 57 Faculty across Australia.

Training Overview

Table 1 outlines the numbers of participants at each level of training over the 2011 - 2012 financial year as well as comparisons with previous years.

The number of BIT participants dropped by 24 this financial year although the combined number of AIT and Certification participants is up by 32. Overall we had an increase of 7 participants in our training events and a drop of 1 in our number of participants in practicum sessions.

As outlined in Table 2, conversion rates (percentage of participants continuing to subsequent stages of training) are up on the last 5 years except at the Advanced Practicum and Certification levels. It should be noted that the numbers continuing training as represented here may not have undertaken their BIW in the same financial year.

The diversity of material demonstrates the application of Choice Theory, Reality Therapy and Lead Management. The board hopes to support further diversification of the products and services it promotes in the coming year.

My ongoing thanks Paula and Jodie for the vital work they do in enabling the smooth handling of training related enquiries and processes.

HUNTER NSW REGION

SYDNEY NSW

In March/April 2012 I volunteered to be the Sydney Regional Coordinator.

- My first step was to understand the NSW membership profile. In the analysis by geographical area, WG training level etc. I discovered that the number of NSW members seemed significantly smaller (totally 89), approximately 1/3 of the number I had envisaged or anticipated. It seems that the NSW members are predominantly educators, who use their WGIA membership to obtain / maintain professional points.
- Secondly, via email, I invited members to a Skype phone conference and requested suggestions for future NSW meetings / gatherings. Less than 10% (6 members) responded or acknowledged the email and/or RSVP'd to the meeting invitation.
- The May 2012 the Skype phone conference was held with only 3 members including myself. Although it was a worthwhile discussion, it certainly was not representative of the NSW membership base. Much of the discussion centred around the history of the WGIA and the current hypothesis of why WG students become or stay members. The agreed actions were:
 - Arrange or schedule another Skype conference after the June 2012 International conference in LA, USA.
 - Draft a survey to establish from members the value they perceive from being members and to seek ideas for future (as well as a few more profile details to enrich the membership analysis)

To date, no further action has occurred, primarily due to my family commitments during July and August and simultaneous search for paid work. In the interim, the WGIA has had a review of its financial longevity and a survey for all members is being developed. I'm eager to continue assisting the WGIA board and members in the hope of adding value, but am questioning whether the drafting of a survey just for NSW is worthwhile or will it potentially detract from the up-coming survey from the Board intended across all Australian members.

If the following hasn't already been done, may I suggest, that WGIA:

- Explores via the survey of members and Choice Theory students, the 'Quality World of a William Glasser member organisation' including asking 'What it is or should be?' and 'What it is not or should not be?'
- Aims to collect responses from at least 200 members and/or Choice Theory students.
- Supports the on-line survey, by follow-up phone interviews for those who might not respond to the online survey. I'm willing to make calls and record the research findings, so that the data can be properly collated and validated for analysis.

I look forward to continuing to volunteer for WGIA, and am mindful that my efforts are limited by my time commitments with family, work and study (including progressing with the William Glasser training post certification). Still, at present my paid work is minimal, so I can spare a day week (possibly more with advanced notice).

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WESTERN AUSTRALIA REGION

As usual in WA we run our training in late February with a Basic Training and a Basic Practicum being run by Maggie Bolton. The sessions continued to build up numbers of CT trainees in two large metropolitan high schools – Ellenbrook Secondary College and Kelmscott SHS. Following the training, I ran two workshops with school chaplains, with over 50 people attending. Hopefully the interest generated there will flow through to Basic Training early next year.

Both schools mentioned above have chosen to adopt a program called Choose Respect, which has been running in the state for about 7 years. Started by a school chaplain, Gary Butcher, the brand has grown in some schools and been picked up by several local councils. The state government recently made \$50,000 available for promoting Choose Respect in the Bunbury area.



The strength of the Choose Respect material from a CT perspective is its emphasis on choice and accepting responsibility for those choices. I hope to work with Gary in the future to explore some common ground between Choice Theory and Choose Respect.
