What a wonderful way to finish training a conference with a faculty day.



REPORT FROM THE TREASURER

The WGIA 2015-2016 unaudited financial year shows a loss of -\$6,790.97, down \$-18,520.90 from 2014-2015 financial year.

The Biennial 2015 Conference was held at the Sunshine Coast in October 2015. Conference income of \$26,354.54 was received in the 2014-2015 financial year with expenses of \$9,778.64 paid in that year, therefore inflating the profit for 2014-2015 by \$9,378.64. Income in the 2015-2016 financial year for the Conference was \$10,877.88 with expenses of \$16,374.64, therefore deflating the profit for 2015-2016 by -\$5,496.76.

The overall profit for the 2015 Conference was \$3,881.88.

The overall profit for WGIA for the last two financial years (2014-2016) is \$4,938.96.

Basic Intensive Training income for 2015-2016 is slightly up by \$2,301.82.

Advanced Intensive Training income for 2015-2016 has increased significantly by \$26,806.38

After the Faculty day, held at the Sunshine Coast in October last year it was apparent that changes to the website were needed. After discussions at Board level it was decided that a creative approach was needed in order to procure funding for the much needed upgrade to the website. Emails were sent out to members requesting monetary donations, marketing tools to be sold and articles for an E-book. \$900 was raised to 30/6/16 with a further \$1000 raised in July and August 2016, with stage one of the website upgrade now in progress. Efforts to raise further funds for the next stages continue.

The cashflow remained consistent for the year. Balances of all bank accounts as at 30/6/16 are as follows:

REPORT FROM THE HONORARY SECRETARY

Working through teleconferencing techniques is a challenge. One factor that enables the current board to meet and work so well together is the prior knowledge we do have of each other's contributions, knowledge and skills. It is a pleasure to work with this group of committed and hard-working board members. Thanks for the opportunity.

Board business included a shifting of the chairs around the table.

- Sheryl resumed the Treasurer's role and John took on the role of Secretary.
- Lorraine changed roles from Training Officer to become the Public Relations Officer.
- Susan changed from 5th Director to become the Training Officer.

Behind the scenes, to progress the website thus far, most of you will have been aware of the Board financial situation and the Board must thank all those who pledged their support in many ways.

The entire plan is not complete yet and work continues, however, we received donations and earned some income. For instance, sitting, selling Dorothy Devine's cards at the "Hand in Hand for Happiness" WGI Conference in Korea was a privilege as I received so many positive endorsements about the set of cards – with their delightful draw-string covers. Carleen Glasser managed to get a set before they sold out. The e-book proposal on the other hand has received limited input at this stage.

Bette, President of WGINZ, made the WGIA and WGI news, as it were, several times during this last twelve months as one of three WGI Board members who developed, trialled and then published, with a full kit of support materials, the Take Charge of Your Life (TCoYL) course. Hopefully everyone is aware that you may present this course once you have completed Choice Theory, Reality Therapy Certification (CTRTC). There is a mentoring session available online for those wanting to present TCoYL. Bette has trialled mentoring a CTRTC group in Ireland and another in Australia.

TCoYL is now available, or soon to be, in Japanese, Spanish, Korean, Persian, French, Kuwait, Croatian. The plan is that some of the TCoYL participants will want to know more and start training with the Basic Intensive Training courses.

I would urge all members and all those who have been assisted by Dr Glasser's teachings in any way to consider how you could contribute to the progress of WGIA. Those who have taken on Dr Glasser's Choice Theory and have built Glasser's approach into your own ventures could consider, when income and profits are secure, how you might contribute to the William Glasser Endowment Fund — a fund set-up so that Dr Glasser's work may continue. The fund was launched in 2014 and quickly reached \$100,000, the aim being to grow it to \$1m so that the interest would fund continuing work, development and support. A one-off payment, an annual payment, or a small amount when appropriate would be most welcome.

I hear of successes where our WGIA instructors have contributed to the drop in the recidivist rate for people released from goals. Data from two Californian prisons, now over 7 years, confirms that such programs make a difference. It is great to learn of these developments in Australia.

Well done WGIA Board members, admirably led by President Bruce.

REPORT FROM THE PUBLIC RELATIONS OFFICER

BACKGROUND:

The position of WGIA Public Relations Officer was established at the WGIA Board online meeting on 14th June, 2016 in response to an urgent need to raise funds to upgrade the current WGIA website.

The **Public Relations Officer Role Description** was submitted and agreed by the Board as follows:

- Source and follow-up contributions for WGIA promotional materials

- Coordinate a selection of Facebook items via email to members

ACTIONS:

Currently, the following actions have been carried out by the Public Relations Officer:

- Over the past 2 months, a number of emails has been sent to all members informing them of the need to upgrade the WGIA website, suggested options for raising funds along with the criteria and deadline for members to submit a written chapter for our proposed eBook.
- Thank you emails were sent to individual members who gave cash donations.
- Reminders, updates and extended deadline emailed to all members.
- To date, cash donations and 3 chapters have been received. It was decided to wait until more chapter submissions are received to name the book based on what the content of the chapters contributed.
- Dorothy Devine's offer for WGIA to take over the rights to sell her set of cards has resulted in card sets sold at the recent WGI Conference in Korea with the proceeds given to upgrading the WGIA website.
- Currently, Stage 1 of the WGIA website upgrade has begun. Further fundraising is to continue for Stage 2 to be able to proceed.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

REPORT FROM THE TRAINING OFFICER

Thank you to all of our Faculty members who work hard at promoting and teaching the principles of Choice Theory at all training levels. We would also like to acknowledge the work of all our regional representatives and members around Australia who assist in running conferences, meetings, and trainings and take the opportunity to promote Choice Theory, Reality Theory and Lead Management. The growth of our organization depends on each members contribution whether it be in time, our interaction with others that serves as a model or by actively promoting the activities of the organization.

We continue to achieve our goal of offering trainings at our biennial conferences. Further training was held at the Sunshine Coast conference using a combination of Australian and overseas instructors. We were able to offer Certification, Practicum Supervisor and Endorsement Training, BIT instructor endorsement and training. We also offered AIT and 14 people did Take Charge of your Life mentoring program. It is exciting for people who reach Certification now to be able to teach CT/RT/LM through an accredited course offered by WGI. Participants at the conference were also given the opportunity to visit Quality Schools in the area.

We are proud to welcome and introduce 3 new faculty members to our institute; Bruce Lloyd from Rockhampton as BIT instructor, Marinela Mendes from Sydney and Anita Spiniello from South Australia as Practicum supervisors. Congratulations on your well-earned achievement.

Akari Komori and Jamie Edwards completed Practicum supervisor training. While Atefeh Soltanifar completed the BIT training phase. Well done. Hopefully we will see them complete their endorsements at the next conference in Newcastle in 2017. Scholarships were given to 2 participants who undertook faculty training.

A number of Faculty members are using Faculty training as an opportunity for further professional development. WGIA benefits from receiving a minimal fee to help cover costs and participants gain from the high standard of professional dialogue and learnings between them and the instructors. Certificates of attendance are available for those who need professional points. This initiative has helped us continue to offer faculty training for small numbers of people.

During 2015, the WGI-A Accreditation Committee was formed. The BIT and practicums have been recognized as acceptable accreditation for Social workers. Another one of our projects is to create a group of people who will be willing to assist in trying to re accredit the Advanced Certificate Course in Clinical Practice of Reality Therapy developed by Joan Hoogstad. Some people have expressed an interest so if you would like to join us in this project please contact me. I have now obtained all the paperwork relating to the course during my recent trip to Adelaide. It would be a fitting tribute to Joan who passed on just recently if we could continue the course. My trip was made all the more meaningful as I was able to attend and catch up with the South Australian arm of the institute during the dinner held in her honour. Her family has agreed to donate all her materials and books to the Institute so we can fundraise with them.

Dorothy Devine has donated her cards to the institute for fundraising too. What a wonderful way to leave a legacy for the future and help the WGIA promote its work.

REPORT FROM THE INTERNATIONAL BOARD REPRESENTATIVE

What an honour it has been to take over the reins from Bette Blance who was on the WGI board for two years filling in John Cooper's position while he is the Chair of WGI.

Being on an international board is a steep learning curve. So many quality worlds, so many languages, so many cultures and so many different perspectives on the same topic.

As Bill Glasser said, it is all in the relationship. For me as a new board rep that has been a very important focus. Building a relationship for myself and continuing the relationship on behalf of NZ and Australia so the needs of our two member organisations are communicated and so that WGI understands how it can build strong and needs satisfying relationships with all member organisations has been an important part of the role.

What has become very clear from interacting internationally is, that all over the world the traditional way of teaching CTRTLM is in decline. Most member organisations are struggling with this financially and in reduced membership numbers and are needing to find creative and innovative ways to stay afloat.

WGI has been working a strategic plan that looks at how to create a financially viable and sustainable international organisation that both supports and enhances member organisations and individual members.

While this is a work in progress, it has been fantastic to be part of this process.

The process was enhanced recently by the contribution of both member organisation representatives and faculty members at the conference in South Korea "Hand in hand for Happiness". Both member organisations and faculty members attended separate opportunities to look at an initial strategic plan and then to go through a process of defining what is the most important and the easiest to achieve. One of the things that did become clearly a very high priority was having a new beaut website that is interactive, appeals to the new IT savvy generation, supports member organisations, has things like an international calendar of training and events was.

Take charge of Your Life has become very successful and is now taught in over 14 countries. This demonstrates that the work the board has been doing to create courses that can be taught by registered trainers is of interest. Currently an RT course is being developed that is targeted to professions such as ambulance drivers, pastors another groups of people who need counselling skills but are not counselling. This becomes another source of revenue for WGI.

A lot of work has been done on looking at the competencies for the BIT etc. training. The importance of this in the big picture is that being competency based allows us to be strategic about being able to market the usefulness of CTRTLM to professionals both individually and to their professional bodies. Basically it has been a process of how do we make what we do more needs satisfying to the world around us that does not know about Glasser?

I attended the conference in South Korea and so did over 350 other people. There were about 80 international guests and so the bulk of the participants were from South Korea.

This is exciting as even though South Korea is much bigger population wise, it demonstrates to us that building and providing needs satisfying conferences attracts people especially when there is an opportunity to enhance skills as well as make new connections.

We also took the opportunity to visit the only Quality school in South Korea. What a place? Not one of us left without tears flowing. The teachers have a philosophy of "Raise the Mind with Love". The students experience salvation in comparison to how their traditional school experience could be.

South Korea has one of the highest suicide rates in the developed world and one of the two highest risk groups is from about 18-30. The pressure to study and achieve is beyond imagination.

I asked our guide, a student who had stayed up all night to write his script for our tour, what he imagined himself doing when he left school. He stated "I would like to be a poet, I love words". Imagine that in a country where students go to school from 8-4 and then study to 11-12 pm plus travel on public transport or board at school. Here was a young man who was in a space where he could imagine being a poet. I could have been talking to the next great philosopher of the next 1000 years. All because of Glasser and the people who continue to teach his work in innovative ways. It was so heartening.

The position for board rep comes up for re-election at the end of the year. I am happy to stand again. However, if there are other people keen, I can say if you are willing to commit a minimum of 156 volunteer hours per year and attend meetings at all sorts of hours, travel to new countries and meet new people while sharing Dr Glasser's work it is very rewarding.

Thank you for the trust you have placed in me this year.

Following are reports from our Regional Coordinators

SOUTH EAST QUEENSLAND REGION

On behalf of the committee for South East Region our report is as follows:

1. Site specific report

Each term at Mudgeeraba Special School the staff are released for Developing Performance conversations with myself and a teacher team leader. These One hour meetings in team groups covers the systemic requirements of goal setting and monitoring with a choice theory overlay.

Focus: At Mudgeeraba Special School we were a Developing Performance Trial School in 2007. We have developed a unique team model where team leaders have been trained and lead the process. The team constitutes Teacher, Teacher Aide and AO2. This team meets fortnightly with the Principal to share their rich conversations with all staff. Each term this team is released to have a coffee date to discuss their Developing Performance Plans, plan, implement and review professional development practices from term to term and over the year. The team informs the Annual Implementation Framework and Quadrennial Strategic Plan. We have 100% staff with plans. We have improved School Opinion and Developing Performance Data. It was noted in the Teaching and Learning Audit as an outstanding school culture. We have more recently aligned it to our Team Charters, Team Meetings between teachers and aides and feedback processes of Collegial Coaching practices as the Teacher is a Regional Mentor and the Teacher Aide representative is a Collegial Coach. All of this is embedded in the beliefs of Choice Theory that we cannot change our staff but we can provide processes to empower them to be the best professional they can be.

In Term 3, 2016 we are releasing each teaming team every Wednesday for one and a half meetings. We meet with each teacher and teacher aide to respectfully have a closed conversation to discuss where their team are and where they are going. The focus for 2016 has been the use of sentence starters to create safe and open conversations. The package was drawn from "A Closer Colleague Circle": A program for developing work relationships for high performance adapted from 'Dialog' University Associates Inc USA. The sentence starters link closely to Choice Theory and Connecting Habits. The feedback has been very positive to date. I have included an emailed anecdote from one of our experienced Teacher Aides.

Just want to say.......(beginning of sentence).....I'm still reflecting on yesterdays session, I feel it's been the most important wonderful 1hr in my working time at school with my teacher/ team member......Thankyou sooooo much for the scariest (just another) opportunity to share thoughts/feelings aloud. I have shared the paperwork with my Andrew to introduce into his team meetings....(not so intense)....1-2 beginnings per meeting.....He's so onto the concept with his employees and team members. Thank you so much for your wise and professional input....... I feel I have new life at work, as I've been feeling ...flat!!!!...My thoughts have been conveyed to Eiji, and well received, with positive outcome returned!

2. General Report

Schools continue to be the most active in implementing Choice Theory and its applications in the South East of Queensland. Schools where training is occurring continue to develop programs that are based on internal control psychology. In some cases parenting programs are being offered and the curriculum for teaching Choice Theory to students has been developed.

The Sunshine Beach State School visit in 2015 by attendees of the highly successful national conference was a highlight, with presentations by students, staff and parents as well as classroom visits. At Peregian Springs the Principal, Gwen Sands gave us a real insight into the running of the school which is also based on internal control psychology.

On payment of the William Glasser International Facilitator Membership, people who are CTRTC (Choice Theory Reality Therapy Certified), can access the material and engage with a mentor to become an accredited facilitator for the Take Charge of Your Life workshop.

Throughout Australia, two CTRTC people have registered as Accredited Facilitators for this six hour workshop. Ines Pintos Lopez is from the South East Queensland region. Congratulations Ines.

Two young 7 year old girls wandered away in the late afternoon from their parents and families whilst camping out of town. The terrain was in an old gold-mining area dotted with dozens of unmarked holes, next to a deep and fast flowing creek, thanks to recent rain, and in an location that experiences regular sub-zero temperatures overnight and daily maximums below 10 degrees.

Thanks to massive search teams, SES coordination and unbelievable courage they were both found 20 hours later relatively unharmed. The choices the girls made to shelter, gather leaves for a pillow and

snuggle together for warmth rather than stumble blindly around avoided a tragedy that would have devastated so many. Puts my snorkelling achievement into humbling perspective.

Unfortunately a negative, anonymous social media campaign then attempted to make mileage out of the whole incident but I won't go there except to suggest the irony of the term "social" media!

The joys of the conference led me to consider volunteering for an organising role in the 2017 conference planning. With mixed blessings this plan stumbled at the first hurdle when my son Philip announced his engagement to the lovely Jena and with a wedding date of 1^{st} October 2017 in the Whitsundays.


The Take Charge of your Life Course (TCOYL) continues to play a pivotal role in helping to teach the world choice theory in South Australia.

Here is a snapshot of what Sue Berry is doing in Port Lincoln and the lower part of Eyre Peninsula...

I have been very busy in Port Lincoln over the last year in a very exciting project! As part of my role as a Family and Youth Counsellor with West Coast Youth and Community Support, I am involved in a community- based initiative called Mentally Fit EP (Eyre Peninsula). This has grown from the efforts of an inspiring young woman Kirsty Traeger who initially spearheaded a fundraising effort which raised \$25,000 to kick-start a program which focussed on mental health - as distinct from mental illness. Kirsty and I worked together in 2015 to present TCOYL to 10 groups in the Lower EP community.

This diagram summarizes what this is all about at this stage. We are continually responding to community input.

My part is running the TCOYL courses – the Education part – and influencing ways of thinking about mental health.



Sadly, Kirsty died in a motor vehicle accident in February this year. Amazingly, the response to this tragedy from her small community of Cummins has been to make even more effort to support the project. Individuals and groups continue to hold awareness nights and fundraising events to keep the project growing. Kirsty is survived by her husband Michael and baby Zac. Michael is heavily involved in MFEP now. He was part of a TCOYL group this year and is committed to promoting the value of it.

As part of her role as Community Development Officer for the Mentally Fit EP project, Jackie Hibble works with me promoting TCOYL and doing the admin. Jackie has now completed her Advanced Intensive Training on the way to becoming a TCOYL facilitator. We hope that she will be able to find a Certification group early in 2017. Local Bendigo Banks are heavily supporting MFEP with grant money for the Jackie's position.

This year Jackie and I presented three community TCOYL courses before end of June. We are committed to sustainability for the TCOYL programs and Sylvia Habel has run two Basic Intensive Trainings here – July 2015 and 2016, with a total of 9 people. I am currently working with 3 people doing a Basic Practicum - two of them are counsellors who agreed to study to Certification when accepting their positions at my workplace. The other is from Kirsty's community – a meditation teacher and Bowen therapist who plans to become a TCOYL facilitator.

I am delighted with the feedback from people completing TCOYL and believe it is making a very worthwhile contribution here.

We are looking at Jackie offering Mental Health First Aid next year too, but that fulfils a different need in the community. I have not heard of any other learning programs on offer which tackle equipping people with knowledge and skills that can immediately improve their mental health.

Having taught 13 TCOYL groups, from teenagers to over 65's, I have ample evidence that as Choice Theory practitioners we have a valuable contribution to make in the area of mental health. Currently we are half way through a TCOYL in the Port Lincoln prison with a group of male inmates interested in making changes in their lives. Great response so far!

I am a little daunted but very excited about the fact that we have put up our hand to run the WGIA conference in 2019 here in Port Lincoln.

Our present goal is to teach TCOYL to 80 local people each year. So far we have reached over 120 since the project began. If we can continue through to October 2019, this will amount to nearly 400 people. From our point of view, the conference will be a chance for the growing group of interested people in our community to get more of a feel for what Choice Theory offers and for us to share the journey of Mentally Fit EP – whatever it has evolved into at that point! For visitors, apart from the connecting and reconnecting, and new learning at the conference, it will also be a chance to experience our unique unspoiled local environment!

NB: Help! I would love to be able to organise a formal evaluation of the program. We have so far met with 'dead ends' when following up with universities. If anyone had any ideas in this direction I would love to hear from them.
